- Each child having a place in the class library to recommend books.
- Peer to peer book reviews, rating stars and sticky notes in books.
- Recommended reads from staff to children.
- Selection of books in class library regularly changed to suit needs of children, projects and interests.
- Headteacher recommended reads in the reading trolley and office window and children borrowing these daily.
- Budget set aside for books to be purchased throughout the year.
- Reading trees with diverse books that are updated and changed.
- Dedicated library time for each class.
- Whole school staff training on INSET day and staff meetings based on reading throughout the year.
- "Mystery reader" when staff come to read to Nursery to support the transition into our Reception.

CASE STUDY GRIMOLDBY PRIMARY SCHOOL



INTENT...

Grimoldby Primary School is situated in a village 10 minutes from the coast, in the East Lindsey District of Lincolnshire. At Grimoldby Primary School, we value inclusivity and believe that every child should leave school with a love for reading. We are passionate that all children need access to all types of books, at home and school. We believe it is so important to buy up-to-date books which allow children to be diverse, inclusive and caring members of our community.

We started working with the English Hub towards the end of the Spring term in 2021. Three staff members initially attended the Witham St Hughs Summer Reading for Pleasure courses in 2021 and our Reading for Pleasure Lead has attended the Transforming your School's Reading Culture (TSRC) throughout 2021-2022. We have fully embraced all the training, guidance, RfP research and pedagogy shared with us on these training sessions and implemented many ideas and strategies.

OUR MAIN INTENTIONS WERE...

- For all teachers to have a diverse and vast knowledge of children's authors to inform their recommendations to children.

- For staff to have knowledge about reading books in school and to be able to recommend reads to our children.
- For parents to be involved in their child's reading journey.

THREE QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR CHILD WHEN THEY'RE READING

VOCABULARY

Understanding vocabulary is an essential part of reading for a child. There is a strong relationship between vocabulary knowledge and reading comprehension. How can we provide our children with a better understanding of the text they have read? Here are some questions for you to ask at home:



KS1:

- 1. What does the word mean in this sentence?**
- 2. Find a word which means.....**
- 3. What does this word or phrase tell you about?**

KS2:

- 1. What do the words and suggest about the character, setting and mood?**
- 2. Which word tells you that....?**
- 3. Find a word that is closest in meaning to.....**
